She is the recipient of several awards recognizing her contribution to innovation in education and international social entrepreneurship, including the Manning Innovation Award for the top social entrepreneur in Canada. Ms. Gordon has had dialogues with His Holiness the Dalai Lama. She is a Member of the Order of Canada and an

Emotional Freedom Techniques ~ Tapping with Children

Patsy Anthony, Teacher, Certified EFT Practitioner, Author Emotional Freedom Techniques, or Tapping, has been shown to calm the amygdala, reduce cortisol, and relieve anxiety, anger, loneliness and sadness. It empowers children to problem solve with empathy, practice mindfulness, and overcome limiting beliefs. In this session, you will discover the enormous benefits of tapping that are simple, relevant and fun.

Facilitation Skills for Inclusive Meetings

This session will highlight strategies to build healthy emotional brains in ways that are easily transferable to the classroom, or any group. His background in outdoor education and music will engage workshop participants and allow creative learning.

Early Years ~ Foundation of Social/Emotional Health

Kirsten Deasey, Early Learning Coordinator, SD#46 Since 2003, Kirsten has been developing programs and models of integration that engage families, schools and community to support the development of children newborn to five. Learning, health and behaviour rest on a foundation determined by the social / emotional connections established early. Learn about the exciting programs of the Sunshine Coast Early Years Centre Project, one of 12 pilot sites in the province.

The Role of SEL in Building Community

Equitas' Play it Fair! program enhances children's voices and participation through active play.

Gumboots and Bear Bangers ~ Tales of Growth from a Nature Program

Jenny and Linda will present key learning and discoveries made through two years spent developing and teaching a K–4 nature based public education program. This experiential session will include conversations around fostering deep classroom connections to nature and community; exploring insights into evolving best practices in teaching,

assessment, and reporting; and how growing green hearts and minds can lead to happier and healthier children and teachers.

Building Resiliency and Belonging Through Classroom-Based School Counselling

Using Universal Design theory, SD#46 has been transforming the Elementary District counselling model to include more classroom-based preventative work. Collaboration with classroom teachers in the delivery of evidence-based interventions has led to increased capacity amongst students and staff.

Be More Than A Bystander

Keely Halward, Program Director, Together Against Violence Services & Program Coordinator and Wayne Spychka, Police Based Victim Services Program Keely and Wayne will present this Sunshine Coast Community Services initiative which invites youth to become champions in ending violence against women. By engaging youth as role models, this program helps identify safe ways to "be more than a bystander". Modeled after the work of Jackson Katz.
